3. Direct activity using adverbial clauses.

A clause is a group of words that contain both a subject and a verb and is used as a part of a sentence.

An independent clause expresses a complete thought and can be used alone as a sentence. Adverbial clauses are very seldom used as independent clauses because they are introduced by subordinating conjunctions.

A dependent adverbial clause can come at the beginning or at the end of a sentence. If it is used in the beginning of a sentence, a comma follows it. An adverbial clause used at the end of a sentence does not usually require a comma. A dependent clause is one that does not express a complete thought, but gives more meaning to the sentence.

Most adverbial clauses modify verbs.

(1) Ask each student to write sentences with the listed adverbial clauses.

(2) Ask each student to create his own adverbial clauses from the listed subordinating conjunctions and write a sentence with each.
